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***Rabbi Lettofsky Announces Four  
Ben/Bat Torah Celebrations***

Some time ago, I shared with the congregation my hopes that others would follow the example set by one of our long-time members and celebrate their Ben or Bat Torah. This is the term Beth Israel has given to what other congregations call an “Adult Bar/Bat Mitzvah.” When I initially spoke with our first Bat Torah, she insisted that she did not want to be celebrating a “Bat Mitzvah,” and I agreed with her. She has been a “Bat Mitzvah” since she reached the age of thirteen! Her family did not mark that occasion, but she has been “obligated” and has been observing adult mitzvot since then. I prefer the name Ben/Bat Torah, which I first heard from Rabbi Philip Horowitz, z”l, who used that term instead of Bar/Bat Mitzvah for thirteen-year-olds. For her Bat Torah, she studied a Torah and Haftorah portion, conducted a Shabbat morning service and delivered an inspiring D’var Torah.

I am anticipating that in the coming weeks and months our congregation will have the privilege of celebrating with four more of our adult members who have been studying biblical and prayerbook Hebrew (and much more) with me on Sunday mornings for several years.

They will be reading--and some will be chanting-- Hebrew. [“Reading” implies understanding, not just “decoding,” simply pronouncing the Hebrew letters.] They will be celebrating their learning and re-affirming for all of us their commitment to the Jewish people and to their own Jewish learning. Two of them converted as adults, and the other two did not celebrate a Bar/Bat Mitzvah at age thirteen.

## Rabbi Speaks on Maurice Sendak's "Uniquely Jewish Perspective" at Lakewood Public Library

An overflow crowd of about 80 people attended Rabbi Lettovsky's January 5 talk at Lakewood Public Library for the opening of the exhibit "In a Nutshell: The Worlds of Maurice Sendak." Sendak, 84, is the illustrator of more than 100 picture books, including the Caldecott Award-winning classic, *Where the Wild Things Are*. The exhibit, which includes several free-standing posters with enlarged reproductions of some of Sendak's illustrations and reflections on his works over a long and distinguished career, is on a national tour.

Rabbi Lettovsky got involved in the project when he received a call from a librarian at Lakewood Public Library asking for The West Temple's support in bringing the exhibit to Cleveland. When the library learned they would host the exhibit, they asked him to speak about Jewish influences in Sendak's life and works. At that point Rabbi Lettovsky began to research the subject and discovered a "Uniquely Jewish Perspective" in Sendak's illustrations. The artist was born in Brooklyn in 1928, and though he was raised as a typical American boy of the time, he was also haunted by photos of relatives left behind in Europe who were murdered in concentration camps. He was also "fascinated by the shtetl world of the European Jew." All these elements are woven together in the images Sendak created in his picture books.

Sendak has always maintained that he is not a writer of children's books—in fact, he doesn't even like children, as he told Terry Gross of NPR's "Fresh Air" in an interview. But his illustrations have a childlike, wide-eyed sense of delight and mystery. The Jewish perspective is summed up in Sendak's statement: "I don't want to lose hope." This, according to Rabbi Lettovsky, is the story of the Jewish people.

Following the Rabbi's lecture, a youthful ensemble led by Max Mueller, a Lakewood High School graduate who recently completed studies in film composing at California State University – Northridge, performed Mueller's music, with narration, to *Where the Wild Things Are*. It made for a perfectly fitting tribute to a great Jewish-American artist.

## Tu B'Shvat

There are many holidays in the Jewish calendar. Some are “big” – Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Passover, for example. Others are “small.” Tu B'Shvat falls into this latter category. In case you're not familiar with Tu B'Shvat, here's a quick overview for you.

- The name Tu B'Shvat is quite unoriginal. The holiday is named for its date: the 15<sup>th</sup> of Shvat. Judaism uses the letters of the alphabet for numbers: tet is nine and vav is six. These numbers sum to 15; these sounds become “Tu.” This year, Tu B'Shvat starts at sundown on February 7th.
- The ancient Israelites needed a way to track the age of a tree during its first five years of development so that they would know if its fruit could be eaten. Tu B'Shvat is based on Leviticus 19:23-25 – “When you come to the land and you plant any tree, you shall treat its fruit as forbidden; for three years it will be forbidden and not eaten. In the fourth year, all of its fruit shall be sanctified to praise God. In the fifth year, you may eat its fruit.” Tu B'Shvat became the birthday of the trees.
- Another name for Tu B'Shvat is Rosh HaShanah la'Ilanot – the New Year of the Trees.
- Today, we celebrate Tu B'Shvat in a variety of ways, two of which are described below.
  - Some Jews will have a Tu B'Shvat seder that highlights the Seven Species, seven agricultural products that are special to Israel and listed in Deuteronomy 8:8 – wheat, barley, grapes, figs, pomegranates, olives, and dates.
  - Other Jews have adopted Tu B'Shvat for environmental-awareness programs. A popular observance is to plant trees in honor or memory of a friend or relative.
- The Tu B'Shvat seder has a particularly meaningful origin. Early mystical thinkers used the image of a tree to represent the relationship between the spiritual world (G-d's world) and the physical world (our world); the spiritual realm contains the tree's roots that then spread and manifest themselves as branches in the material realm. In the 16th century, the kabbalistic master Isaac Luria of Safed combined this interpretation of the tree's symbolism with the idea of the Passover seder and created a Tu B'Shvat seder. This celebration permitted the kabbalists to honor the tree, enjoy the fruits native to Israel, and discuss the philosophical and mystical concepts associated with the holiday.

## What is a Shabbaton? Our educators provide answers:

### From Bela's Basket

Every year I feel that although we begin religious school just after Labor Day, things really start happening after the first of the year because this is when we have most of our Shabbatonim. For those who are not actively involved in these let me tell you what they are.

Shabbatonim are held once a year and once per class. The purposes of the Shabbatonim are: enrich the classroom experience, involve the parents in what their children are learning, and create community. A subject is chosen, and the shabbaton is built around the subject. There is an active learning component. For example, sometimes an art project is connected with the theme. Sometimes, students and parents work together; other times, students and parents work in parallel.

At Beth Israel -- The West Temple students start their education in a group of grades (such as 5th/6th/7th) that stay together until they graduate. We promote making connections between the classes' families while the children are young because (as you probably have heard) it takes a community to bring up a child.

This year, our first shabbaton will take place on 1/27 just as Winter University is wrapping up. The first class participating in a shabbaton is the 5-6-7 class, and they have a special one because it is part of a larger program called "Count Me In." The teachers, Robyn Kahn and Holly Neumann, have been studying with teachers from around the community and will work with our kids during the shabbaton, passing on to them what they learned. The program will culminate with a community-wide program where more than 200 youngsters will work on the "Count Me In" theme at B'nai Jeshurun, a temple on the east side. We are very excited to be part of this program. It gives our students the chance to connect with a larger group of youth. That evening, the parents of this class are invited to participate in a special program that will be held at the Maltz Museum of Jewish heritage. We hope to have a good participation from our students and our parents.

Winter U got off to a rousing success. People sat around playing poker and studying about the judges.

Others learned about baking knishes, a favorite Jewish dish, and our youngest participants learned about the number HAMESH (five) and about YAD (hand). They were involved decorating Hamsas (a colorful amulet) that can be displayed at the entrance to a home. These Hamsas will be displayed, ready to be purchased, on 1/29, which is the last day of our Winter University.

### Notes from the Educator

A Shabbaton is a special Shabbat program that provides an opportunity for our students and their families to come together with the other members of their Religious School class, learning and sharing, and making real the curriculum of the classroom. Families enjoy a study session, Shabbat dinner, Shabbat service and a concluding oneg. The children also take a special part in the service.

This February, our Middle School class (grades 5-6-7) will celebrate with their peers across the Cleveland Jewish community for a retreat titled "Count Me In." Their January Shabbaton was the first of three sessions of special learning as a preparation for coming together with students their same age from ten other Cleveland congregations! Parents had their own part to play in the Shabbaton learning, and they too will come together with the parent community for a parallel event at the Maltz Museum. The Middle School retreat and Parent get-together will both take place on Saturday, February 11.
