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from the Rabbi's Desk...

Shavuot and Standing, Again, at Sinai



In his book *Seasons of Our Joy: A Celebration of Modern Jewish Renewal*, Rabbi Arthur Waskow opens his chapter on the festival of Shavuot with a lovely description of this time of year: “The spring comes to its climax, hovers on the edge of summer... Now comes the moment of the great Meeting... with the Infinite Other. The people of Israel, on the trek from slavery, meet at the mountain – meet the Voice that becomes visible, meet the universe that sheds its silence and begins to Speak. The weeks of tension end in the Festival of Weeks – Shavuot.” (p. 185) But, Torahitically, Shavuot – celebrated on the 6th of Sivan – is the Festival of the First Fruits; it is a harvest festival, celebrating the wheat and barley harvests seven weeks of seven days after the first day of Pesach. There is no mention of standing at Sinai and receiving Torah specifically on this day. How did it come to be? For the rabbis of the Second Temple period, who found in engaging in words of Torah their true contact with God, the main point of God’s liberating the Israelites from Egypt was to make possible God’s giving them the Torah at Mount Sinai. Since Pesach clearly celebrated that liberation, it would make sense that the next great festival, Shavuot, would celebrate the gift. In their turning to the text of Exodus 19, and considering that: if counting the weeks began at the conclusion of the first day of Pesach, and if the people entered the area of Sinai on the first of Sivan and the preparations at the foot of the mountain took three days, and if the Revelation had come on the sixth of Sivan, then after their arrival and preparation time there would be three days for the people to march to the mountain and for Moses to converse with God. This period of time seemed to be reasonable for the

tasks that had to occur... and Shavuot was not only the Festival of First Fruits, but also celebrated the Giving of the Torah. Indeed, after the destruction of the Second Temple, the continuation of Shavuot would have been very difficult if its observance had been based on sacrifices alone... Our journey began at Pesach – a headlong flight out of Egypt; for seven weeks, focused forward, seeing the back of the person in front of us. Then, arriving at Sinai, we came to stand face to face with the Divine. It was also time to stop and come face to face with each other... and, together, receive our Gift – the gift of Torah. Our celebration of Shavuot will begin Tuesday evening, June 3rd, at 7:30 p.m. as our Confirmation Class leads our Erev Shavuot and Confirmation Service. For those interested in participating in an evening of learning, B'nai Jeshuran Congregation will be hosting a **Tikkun Leil Shavuot** (which our congregation is helping to sponsor) with study sessions beginning at 7:00 p.m. and continuing throughout the night. We will continue here at Beth Israel – The West Temple on Wednesday morning, June 4th, at 9:00 a.m. with our Shavuot Morning Service as we, once again, stand at Sinai. Looking Back on the 2013-14 Religious School Year



I have used the paradigm of Keva, Kavannah, and Kehilla – Create, Collaborate, and Congregate, as the lens through which I view the events of the past eleven months and to imagine the coming year.

The Keva, Kavannah, and Kehillah paradigm and its objectives were: (1) BI-TWT's Religious school will create the learning by which students become equipped to live it. (2) Special collaborations of students, teachers and additional facilitators will present new ways of learning into the curriculum (called chuggim or enrichment activities like Library, Art, Music, Drama, and Cooking). (3) Learning will be expressed and shared at events strategically placed on the calendar at times when the community congregates.

The questions I have asked of the paradigm that structured our year are: (A) In what ways were the paradigm's objectives met? (B) In what ways were the goals not met and why? (C) How might we change the paradigm or improve elements of our program to better achieve its goals?

Our educational programs this past year have been delivered by volunteer instructors some of whom have served BITWT for many years and others who just joined recently. In grades K- 6 our students learn Hebrew, Jewish holidays and Torah; are introduced to prayer, ritual observance, tzedakah; and interact with material related to Israel.

A Seder in Uganda

At first I thought it would be impossible to celebrate Passover in a country that has probably never seen matzah; but my son, Alex, and I were going to visit his Dad, serving in the Peace Corps in Uganda, from April 5-20. Soon, the challenge of making a Seder in Robert's apartment took hold of my imagination. I asked him to run the idea by Ari, the other Jewish Peace Corps Volunteer in Mbarara. Ari's wife, Kelli, is not Jewish, and although she told me upfront that she had only attended two Seders in her life, she was willing to help. The tight-knit group of six PCVs in Mbarara party together frequently, along with a few other Westerners living in what they call the Expatriate Compound. It's a little like a college dorm, with people popping in on one another frequently to share news, or borrow anything from tools to tableware. No one has enough dishes to serve the whole crowd, and no one can manage to cook for all, but everyone pitches in and brings what's needed.

So I began planning about a month ahead of the trip. There wouldn't be a lot of time for cooking, because Robert had arranged for us to take a weekend safari to the town of Fort Portal and Queen Elizabeth National Park. We decided to do a second-night Seder on Tuesday. There would be ten at table, counting the six PCVs, plus two Americans living in the apartment directly below Robert's, plus Alex and me. First I went on Amazon to find an edition of the Haggadah that's lightweight and cheap enough to bring ten of. Having already visited in the fall, I knew I could get fresh vegetables and meat (though of less than USDA prime quality) in Mbarara, but anything marked "Kosher for Passover" would have to come from home. I figured I could find room in the suitcases for matzah, meal, chicken bouillon, cookies, macaroons, and a box of our favorite, Barton's parve chocolates. (Good dark chocolate is hard to come by at any time in Uganda.) Two bottles of Israeli wine could be wrapped up in t-shirts for protection, but there was no way I was going to attempt to bring jars of gefilte fish.

Then I remembered seeing live chickens in all the outdoor markets, and thought it might be fun to try cooking them, rather than using the frozen chickens I would find in the local supermarket. I asked our driver, Charles, on the way back from Queen Elizabeth, whether we could get those chickens butchered and plucked for us, and he assured us we could. He even kindly offered to take us into the Central Market to show us where and how to buy live chickens. Once Charles led us to the corner where the chickens' coops are

Our beloved Rabbi Enid held THREE Seders this year, in a period of 7 days!!

The first was the Congregational, Second-night Seder—which nearly 100 people attended!! (Don't forget, we haven't always held 2nd-night seders).

The second was the annual Womens' Seder, which approximately 50 women attended. This event is open to women of the congregation and their mothers, grandmothers, daughters, granddaughters, and female friends. Over the years, many non-observant (including "long-lost") Jews attend, and some later begin to participate in our congregation.

Thirdly, we collaborated in an Interfaith Seder with a Westside Christian Church, who hosted the first Interfaith Joint Seder last year. There were 50 attendees to this seder as well, including ministers from two Westside churches and a lot of return participants from last year. The enthusiasm and enjoyment of participants was very evident. A few of our members were present as well.

We owe a *todah rabah g'dolah* to Rabbi Enid for her leadership, sharing with so many—and for her incredible stamina to do so much!! (submitted by an admirer)

stacked, we introduced ourselves to a couple of the sellers, and Charles showed us how to spread the feathers apart to determine if the chicken is fat. We didn't buy that day, because we were concerned about freshness--electricity is unreliable in Uganda, and if the power went down, our refrigerated chickens would be in trouble.

On Monday when we went back, at least six men rushed up to us, each thrusting two or three chickens under our noses, saying, "This is a good one! This is a good one!" There was no chance of calmly examining them for fat, but I did try to get across the idea that I wanted hens, not roosters. The merchants didn't seem to understand these English terms. I'm still not sure what we ended up with.

The chicken sellers offered to remove the heads and guts, but I wanted the feet, because I remembered my grandma telling me many years ago that they gave strength and flavor to the soup. So home we went, carrying our warm, recently live chickens, feet and all, to cut into usable pieces. The feet, backs and necks went into the soup, and I'm proud to tell you, the soup was good! Of course I made matzah balls, and they were also tasty, though I didn't get any schmaltz from the chickens. The rest of the parts, when baked for the main course, were so tough as to be barely edible.

Tuesday evening, the guests brought an extra coffee table to connect with ours, allowing some to recline on the sofa and upholstered chairs while the rest of us sat at the dining table. They also brought their assigned vegetables, salad, fruit, eggs, and flowers, along with a tablecloth, plates, bowls and utensils.

Robert led us through the rituals, readings, and discussion with lively participation from all. For some of our friends, it was their first Seder ever, and they all seemed to enjoy it as much as everyone does in the USA. Our Jewish friend commented that he learns something new every year, and this was no exception.

After it was over, I congratulated myself on how well it came off, considering the challenges we faced. During my preparations, I had come across some new variations on the age-old question: How is this night different from all other Passover nights? And how will this year prepare us to make a difference in the year to come? Obviously, the answer to Question One was that this was the first Seder any of us had celebrated in Uganda. As to Question Two, the rich experiences we have all had this year will surely lead us to see the world differently, and to understand our place in it in a new way.
