from the Rabbi's Desk...

A Time to Breathe... A Time to Move Forward...



This year, the first of November corresponds to the first of Cheshvan, the eighth month of the Jewish calendar. The past month was filled with holiday celebrations: beginning with Rosh HaShanah, and ten days later - Yom Kippur, and five days later - Sukkot, and a week later - Simchat Torah, and one week later – Rosh Chodesh Cheshvan, the new month of Cheshvan.

There are no festivals during Cheshvan. For this reason, our tradition refers to this month as “Mar Cheshvan” – “Bitter Cheshvan.” I respectfully have to disagree. To me, Cheshvan gives us all a wonderful opportunity to breathe. We have a wonderful opportunity to stop and take a breath, to look around and take in the fast-developing fall. We have a wonderful opportunity to look forward each and every week to celebrate Shabbat, to focus on what it means to have – and to make – a time to stop and thank God for good health, family, and friends.

During Tishrei’s festivals we focused on our relationships, and on mending and healing. We thought about how we search for truth(s) and how to speak with and listen to each other to deepen our own understandings. We considered that “God” is not a noun, but a verb – “Godliness” – and how we can bring the actions of repair and learning and living into our own lives. And we reflected on the choices that we are called upon to make each and every day... and how we would hope to make life-enhancing decisions to the best that we are able. Our sukkah reminded us of the fragility of our lives and as we ended Deuteronomy and began Genesis once again, we

celebrated our Torah as a true “Tree of Life” – seeing ourselves in the all too human actions of our ancestors.

Focus. Thinking.
Considering. Reflecting.
That was Tishrei.

from the Sustainability Committee The End of Phase I

At this time last year we were only about half-way through the Phase I renovations on our building. I am happy to report that this work is now nearly complete. What remains is cosmetic and the Board just approved the winning bid for this work. To date we have raised over \$320,000, of which \$75,000 came from the children of former members Harold and Ruth Friedman of blessed memory. In addition, Jewish Federation of Cleveland helped with our security upgrades.

So far we have spent \$314,886 on the following:

\$ 177,757 – Security upgrades

\$ 11,120 – Accessibility upgrades (Ramp, new entrance, lift, ADA bathroom)

\$ 69,261 – Comfort upgrades (Air conditioning and new boiler)

\$ 36,937 – Other (Architectural plans, permits, etc.)

\$ 19,811 – 10% transfer to Building Fund

But we know that a lot more needs to be done to make the building look as good as we hope it now feels. We have engaged interior designers and architects to help us put together the projects that will make up Phase II. Here are the rooms on our makeover list: the bathrooms, the kitchen, the library, Ratner Hall, Café Aroma, Pat’s office, the Rabbi’s office, and our main sanctuary. A few things are going to be expensive – for example, replacing the sanctuary chairs. But we can do some of the work ourselves with little out-of-pocket expense. Some of that work has already taken place. This summer Carola Bamberger and Debbie Chessin organized repainting of the classrooms. And Evan Fleisher brought in a crew of adults and high school students who nearly emptied the storage space behind the Bimah.

We have nearly spent everything we raised for Phase I, so we will have to raise more money to complete Phase II. We have some ideas for how to do this and we will soon share them with you.

Our little shul on Triskett Road has been a home for Jews on Cleveland’s West side for over 60 years and will continue to be our home for many years to come.

The renovation campaign’s goal is to bring our building up to 21st century standards, while retaining its charm and *haimish*-ness. Think of it as modernizing tradition – a very Reform-minded idea.

Every year, to mark Human Rights Day on December 10th, hundreds of thousands of people around the world take part in Amnesty International's annual **Write For Rights** campaign, hand-writing letters to help people they've never met. Letter writing has always been at the core of Amnesty's work, and 55

years of human rights activism show that our letters really DO have the power to change lives. These letters help convince government officials to release people imprisoned for expressing their opinion (called “prisoners of conscience” by Amnesty), support human rights defenders, stop torture, commute death sentences, and end other human rights abuses. Last year, our High School class wrote 70 letters, and we learned a few months later that three of the political prisoners we wrote letters on behalf of had been freed!

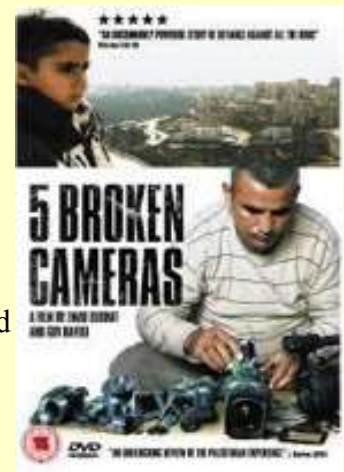
CHAI Film Fest

5 Broken Cameras is Palestinian film-maker Emad Burnat's diary of his fellow villagers' (non-violent) protest response to Israel's security fence and to Jewish settlements on what he considers his land. Hailed as an artistic success, the film won an award at the prestigious Sundance Festival. The film alternates between scenes of protest activity and Burnat's family life viewed through five successive video cameras.



Along with garnering film awards, *5 Broken Cameras* has garnered much controversy as the documentary is seen from a very specific point of view. We'll watch, we'll reflect, and we'll discuss this film. Dessert to follow.

Yasher Koach to BI-TWT High School Students Hannah Cutrona and Carly Chessin – our representatives on this year's 2016-2017 Saltzman Youth Panel.

Last May 25th, the 2015-2016 Maurice Saltzman Youth Panel of the Jewish Federation of Cleveland recommended grants totaling \$40,000 to 11 organizations for crucial programs in the Jewish and general communities.

The Saltzman Youth Grant Program of the Jewish Federation was established in 1998 by Shirley Saltzman and her family to educate younger members of the Jewish community about the importance of Jewish communal decision-making, the philanthropic process and responding to Jewish and general community needs. The program perpetuates the goals of the late Maurice Saltzman, a past president of the Jewish Federation, who cared deeply about educating the next generation of Jewish community leadership.

The 2015-2016 Saltzman Youth Panel consisted of 40 area high school juniors and seniors who were selected through youth group advisor, rabbi and religious school director nominations as well as from at-large applications. Panel members met seven times throughout the school year. They created a Request for Proposals, reviewed grant applications, learned about consensus decision-making and, in the end, had a tremendous impact on programs which improve the lives of others.

Among the grants were \$7,500 to the Hebrew Shelter Home for new furniture and appliances, \$7,500 to Jewish Family Service Association (JFSA) to provide an improved multisensory environment for adults with developmental disabilities, \$7,000 to Menorah Park to support rehabilitation programs for patients with Parkinson's Disease, \$2,500 to help create an ecological coexistence playground in Israel to promote peace and educate young people, a program run by our international partner, the Jewish Agency for Israel, and \$1,600 to The Free Medical Clinic of Greater Cleveland for the Teen Clinic and Outreach Education program.
