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from the Rabbi's Desk...

Is Voting a Jewish Obligation?



Each issue of *Moment* magazine features the column “Ask the Rabbis.” In the May/June issue, the question was: “Are we commanded to vote?” Commanded? That is a pretty loaded word, and most of the rabbis (if not all) responded that voting is not commanded—but it is a responsibility—an obligation—grounded in Jewish values.

When our exiled ancestors found themselves in Babylonia after the destruction of the First Jewish Commonwealth more than 2,400 years ago, the prophet Jeremiah sent the following instructions to them: “To all I have exiled from Jerusalem to Babylon, build houses and settle down, plant gardens and eat of their fruits. Start families, have children, and increase your numbers. Also, seek the peace of the city to which I have exiled you, and pray to God on its behalf, for in its prosperity you shall prosper” (Jeremiah 29:4-7). As we pray for the well-being of the country in which we find ourselves, we have come to understand that voting is a key way to assure the well-being of a country.

In civil law, we are guided by the Talmudic dictum of Samuel: “dina d’malkhuta dina,” the law of the country is binding (Bava Kamma 113b). And, all who benefit from public services are obliged to help provide them (Bava Batra 7b). The act of voting goes hand in hand with supporting the government and its laws, but we have also come to understand voting as a way to do the most good: to pursue justice (Deut. 16), to love the stranger/immigrant (Deut. 10), to maintain our environment (Genesis 2), and to honor all created in the Divine image (Genesis 1).

In the 21st century, we Jews take our right to vote for granted. It wasn't always the case. In the original American colonies, the right to vote, and the right to hold office were restricted to white, Protestant, land-owning men. How many years... centuries... did it take for these restrictions to be overturned—for Jews, for Catholics, for women, for African-Americans?

The first step to being able to vote is to make sure you are registered to vote! Tuesday, September 27th, is National Voter Registration Day. Are you registered? Is your 18-year-old registered? If you are a registered voter and have moved recently, have you sent in your change of address so that you are registered in the proper voting station? Would you like to help others register to vote? You can register to vote and confirm or change your registration by following this link:

<https://www.usa.gov/register-to-vote>. You can help register voters with forms available at temple. We are planning some on-sight voter registration opportunities and will be in need of volunteers; dates and times will be forthcoming. If you would like to volunteer, please let me know and we will move forward together. And soon it will be time to vote!

In the words of Rabbi Laura Novak Winer, "Today, voting is more than a right or a privilege. It is an obligation incumbent upon us [all] as equal citizens in a democratic society."

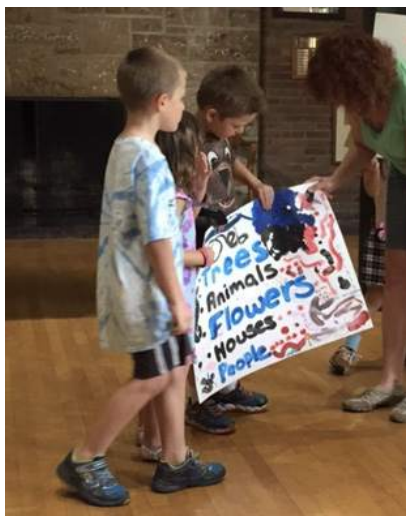

BI-TWT Launches 2016-17 Social Action Program

This fall we are launching a new 2016-17 Social Action program at the West Temple. We'll have the opportunity to learn and take action across generations around the theme of **Welcoming the Stranger**.

Rabbi Jonathan Sacks, the former Chief Rabbi of Great Britain, said, "Why should you not hate the stranger? – asks the Torah. Because you once stood where he stands now. You know the heart of the stranger because you were once a stranger in the land of Egypt. If you are human, so is he. If he is less than human, so are you. You must fight the hatred in your heart as I once fought the greatest ruler and the strongest empire in the ancient world on your behalf. I made you into the world's archetypal strangers so that you would fight for the rights of strangers – for your own and those of others, wherever they are, whoever they are, whatever the colour of their skin or the nature of their culture, because though they are not in your image – says G-d – they are nonetheless in Mine. There is only one reply strong enough to answer the question: Why should I not hate the stranger? Because the stranger is me" (Rabbi Jonathan Sacks, *Covenant and Conversation*, p. 186).

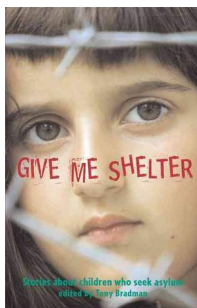


Today this concept is more important than ever as we seek to build strong, compassionate communities locally and beyond. Through a variety of activities, we hope to create opportunities for education and action about the important and challenging work of welcoming today's strangers. Our hope is to engage the West Temple community when and where we already gather, through the religious school, book club, Circle of Friends, Torah study, and holiday celebrations. For the religious school, this theme will be woven into planning for the Gemilut Hasadim portion of the curriculum.

We plan to partner with some organizations that are Welcoming the Stranger in our communities, including US Together, a refugee resettlement organization here in Cleveland.



We hope to culminate the learning process with a joint activity in the spring that will provide the opportunity to build relationships with Cleveland's refugee community, some of today's "strangers."



As a first step, we invite you to participate in the next **Book Club discussion on Sunday, October 9, at 10:30 a.m.**, in Ratner Hall. To start learning within our theme, we'll be reading *Give Me Shelter: Stories About Children Who Seek Asylum* by Tony Bradman. The book features stories from youth based in trouble spots around the world who have been forced to leave their homes or families to seek help and shelter elsewhere. Several copies of the book will be available if you are interested but can't find the book at your library and don't want to purchase it.

Join us for our Selichot Program as we begin our year of celebrating Mitzvah Heroes.

Who is a “mitzvah hero?”

Someone who helps to make a difference in our world from small acts of kindness, to large organizational development, and many things in between.



For our first hero, come and meet Erin Huber, a social entrepreneur and the executive director and founder of Drink Local. Drink Tap., Inc. She has a 16-year history of civic engagement, project management, working with youth, mentoring, leadership, volunteerism, environmental stewardship, and academic accomplishments proven by an extensive list of awards and honors. In

2013, she was selected to present at bigBANG! in Cleveland, Ohio. She was also named one of Cleveland’s Most Interesting People of 2012 by Cleveland Magazine, inducted into the 2012 Mentor High School (Ohio) Alumni Hall of Fame, awarded the 2012 Distinguished Alumni Award from the Urban College at Cleveland State University, featured as a water action figure by Circle of Blue, and was chosen as one of Cleveland Scene’s People July 2016. Huber is the executive producer of the 2014 documentary *Making Waves* and advocates for safe water through speaking engagements domestically and designing and building safe water projects globally in east Africa.

Her mission is to save our water and save lives.

Erin recently returned from Uganda and Kenya. She will speak about her work in Cleveland and East Africa, as well as her connection to the Abudayan Jewish community in Uganda. Our program will include a Dessert Reception and will be followed by our Selichot Service

Rabbi Lader will again lead our Family Service for Rosh HaShanah in the Trailside Theater at the Rocky River Nature Center on Monday afternoon, October 3rd. Just imagine, as Rosh HaShanah celebrates the birthday of the world, reading the opening lines from the book of Bereishit (Genesis) in the midst of beautiful trees and hearing the call of the shofar in the midst of the sounds of nature.

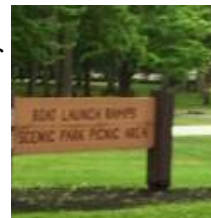


Our family-friendly service and tashlich program are open to all.

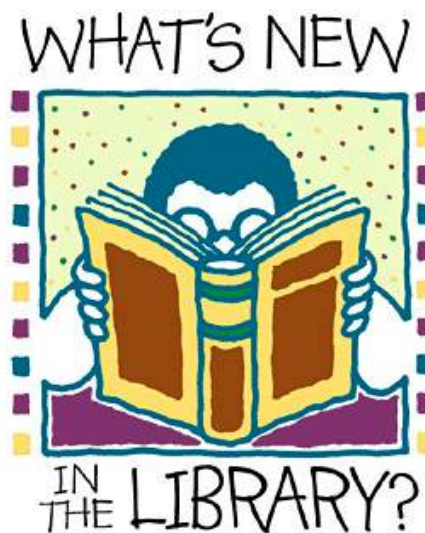
